Behavioral Health Bridge Housing (BHBH) Program Overview

California's Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) will provide a total of \$1.5 billion in funding to county behavioral health agencies and tribal entities to operate bridge housing settings to address the immediate housing needs of people experiencing homelessness who have serious behavioral health conditions, including a serious mental illness (SMI) and/or substance use disorder (SUD).





Purpose and Priorities

- The BHBH Program provides funding for operational and supportive services, not covered under other funding sources, to expand bridge housing implementation.
- > The following priorities drive the implementation of the BHBH Program:
 - > This is a critical need, and the focus is on immediate solutions.
 - Collaboration will complement ongoing state, county, and Tribal efforts to address homelessness.
 - BHBH Program settings will provide supportive services and housing navigation to assist people who have serious behavioral health conditions and are experiencing homelessness.

Tribal Entities RFA – Round 2B



Tribal Entities RFA – Round 2B

This round of BHBH Program funding will make available more than \$20,000,000 to eligible California applicants for use in the planning and implementation of bridge housing services for individuals in Tribal communities who are experiencing homelessness and have serious behavioral health conditions (serious mental illness and/or substance use disorder).





Definition of Homelessness

An **individual** or **family** experiencing **homelessness** is **defined** as any of the following:

- Lacking a fixed, regular, and **adequate nighttime residence;**
- With a primary residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings;
- Living in a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter, designed to provide temporary living arrangements;
- Exiting an institution into homelessness (regardless of length of stay in the institution);
- Who will **imminently lose housing** in the next 30 days;
- Fleeing domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, and other dangerous, traumatic, or life-threatening conditions relating to such violence.



Definition of Serious Behavioral Health Condition

Individuals with serious mental illness and/or substance use disorders are eligible for services through BHBH programs:

The individual is experiencing significant impairment, or there is a reasonable probability, of significant deterioration in an important area of life functioning

AND

The individual has at least one diagnosis, or a suspected diagnosis, from the current edition of the *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM)* for a mental disorder or a substance-related and addictive disorder, with the exception of Tobacco-Related Disorders and Non-Substance-Related Disorders

Eligible Applicants

• Eligible applicants in California include:

- Federally recognized Indian Tribes
- > Tribal organizations
- Urban Indian organizations
- Health care program operated by an Indian Tribe, a tribal organization, or an Urban Indian organization

(defined in <u>Sections 1603</u> and <u>5304</u> of USC Title 25)

- Other eligible applicants include organizations with written support from an eligible tribal entity (listed above) for a proposed BHBH program benefitting a tribal community.
 - Written support may be in the form of a tribal or board resolution, memorandum, or other legally binding agreement
 - Examples: Tribally Designated Housing Entities, nonprofits 501(c)(3) corporations, or forprofit businesses

Track 1 and Track 2: Overview

Total BHBH Program Funding: \$20M

Track 1: Planning Grant

- Funding Request: \$150,000
- Term: through April 30, 2025

Track 2: Implementation Grant

- Maximum Funding Request: \$5M
- Term: through March 31, 2027

Track 1: Planning



Purpose of Track 1: Planning Grants

The Planning Grant is to assist Tribal communities in developing a plan for how to best serve individuals with a serious behavioral health condition who are experiencing homelessness.

Planning grants will be awarded in amounts of \$150,000.





Planning activities may include, but are not limited to:





Track 1: Minimum Requirements





Track 1: Planning Grants - Allowable Uses of Funds





Expressly intended for **planning**, **predevelopment**, and **capacity building**.

May not be used for direct services or housing.

Track 2: Implementation



Purpose of Track 2: Implementation Grants

This track is intended to support grantees in launching and operating a BHBH program to address the immediate housing needs of individuals in their communities experiencing homelessness and serious behavioral health conditions, including SMI and/or SUD.

Applicants may request any amount up to \$5 million in funding.

- Larger projects including BHBH start-up infrastructure are eligible; eligible applicants that have small projects focused on addressing the immediate housing needs of a **few individuals** are also encouraged to apply.
- Applicants who are interested in both planning and implementation activities should **only** apply under Track 2: Implementation Grant.



Possible Settings



Bridge housing settings may be existing facilities, leased or owned by either a tribal entity or a provider/partner, that can be converted for use faster than a new capital project.

Eligible applicants are encouraged to explore innovative models using existing real estate that can be leased or quickly converted to create new BHBH program settings.

Tiny homes	Master-leased units or buildings	Office, school, or warehouse conversions
Hotels and motels	Converted churches and other community settings	Duplexes or large single- family homes
Modular buildings	Converted SNFs, assisted living, hospital conversions, etc.	Scattered-site individual units

Bridge Housing Activities

For purposes of the BHBH Program, "bridge housing" is defined as short- and mid-term residential options and serves as a bridge to longer-term housing.

Bridge Housing Start-up Infrastructure

The primary purpose of the BHBH Program is not construction, but the operation of bridge housing and supports for individuals experiencing homelessness; however, some funds may be spent on start-up infrastructure.

Examples of allowable start-up infrastructure costs include:

- ✓ the initial purchase of furniture, equipment, and appliances
- minor renovations to make necessary accessibility modifications for people who have behavioral health conditions
- ✓ the purchase and placement of tiny homes and related utility hookups and supportive facilities
- ✓ costs related to facility renovations, including allowable adaptive reuse
- ✓ bridge housing, as long as the start-up is expected to be completed and the bridge housing brought online within one year of contract execution

All of these allowable expenditures must fit within the \$75,000 per-bed limit. See RFA Attachment B, pages 24-27, for additional requirements.



Requesting an Exception to the Budget Specifications

The BHBH Program is committed to supporting the successful implementation of the BHBH program in a manner that meets the needs of the communities served. In recognition of this, applicants may choose to request an exception from some of the requirements.

The following are the only funding requirements for which applicants may request an exception. No other exceptions will be approved:

- \$75,000 per-bed limit on BHBH start-up infrastructure
- BHBH start-up infrastructure completion within one year of contract execution

The California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) is pleased to announce the release of the Behavioral Health Bridge Housing (BHBH) Program Tribal Entities Request for Applications (RFA).

This Round 2B of BHBH Program funding will provide more than \$20 million to eligible applicants in California to operate bridge housing settings to address the immediate housing needs of individuals in tribal communities experiencing homelessness who have serious behavioral health conditions, including serious mental illness (SMI) and/or substance use disorder (SUD).

Eligible applicants are invited to apply for Track 1: Planning Grants or Track 2: Implementation Grants. Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis over two periods, with two preliminary application deadlines: April 17, 2024, and June 19, 2024, at 4:00 p.m. Pacific Time (PT). Additional rolling application periods will be added, as needed, until the funds are depleted.

- organizational chart
- budget
- budget narrative
- □ necessary supporting documentation
